

Mark CYPHER (Australia) Darwin, 2007 World Premiere

Mark Cypher's *Darwin* attempts to chart the real time evolution of the 'Darwinism' meme. Computer software harvests information gathered from neo-Darwinist and Intelligent Design blogs. The software then allows this data to interact with a virtual three-dimensional rendering of Charles Darwin's head. The forms and patterns that result are snap shots in time of the mutating 'meme' that was once Darwinism.

Daniel LEE (USA/Taiwan) *Origin*, 2004 Australian Premiere

Daniel Lee's *Origin* espouses his Darwinian beliefs and explores the theme of man's evolution from and connection to other animal species: "My motivation derives from the new Millennium (year of 2000) which suggests to me the grand beginning of everything ... I proposed that there were ten stages in human evolution, from the fish form (as Coelacanth) eventually transforming to reptiles, apes and humans."

Christa SOMMERER & Laurent MIGNONNEAU (Austria & France) Eau de Jardin, 2004 Australian Premiere

Christa Sommerer & Laurent Mignonneau's *Eau de Jardin* was inspired by Claude Monet's late Water Lillies paintings and their panoramic setting at the Musée de l'Orangerie in Paris. *Eau de Jardin* is an interactive installation transporting visitors into the imaginary world of virtual water gardens. As visitors approach a series of hanging amphorae containing living plants, sensors respond to their actions and create virtual water plants on a large immersive screen. As interaction with the real plants develops, more virtual plants appear on the screen reflecting the evolving nature of the interaction.

Bill VIOLA (USA) Observance, 2002

Bill Viola has long been fascinated with the perception of time, uncovering the minutae embedded within otherwise invisible moments. *Observance* brings a range of human emotion into stark view as a procession of mourners slowly approach the viewer in single file, pausing to gaze momentarily at "something they'd rather not see...to say goodbye to someone who'd left them behind." Viewers bear silent witness to a range of powerful emotions through extremely slow playback of hi-speed image capture.

Lynette WALLWORTH (Australia) Still: Waiting2, 2006

Lynette Wallworth's *Still: Waiting2*, sets up an ecosystem, a space complete within itself wherein the participant/viewer actively contributes to the revelation of the work. Sensors guide the participants in the 'protocols' of the revelatory behaviour – particularly responding to stillness. Participants negotiate with 'newcomers' to ensure that previously established intimacies are preserved *Still: Waiting2* reflects on the reality that, over eons, all organisms that remain in direct contact with each other develop mutually beneficial systems of adaptation and inter-dependence and that these specialisations may need deciphering by newcomers to the system.

PICA is proud to present four individual artist projects as part of the 3rd Biennale of Electronic Arts Perth. Titled, *I took a deep breath...*, this ambitious selection of works brings together electronic art practices from a range of leading Australian and international artists. Each work offers an engagement with the complex notion of stillness, providing a stimulating experience of contemplative and perceptual meditations and embodied experiences.

Austrian artist, Ulf Langheinrich, will captivate viewers with the Australian premiere of *WAVEFORM B*, an immersive multi-level, audiovisual experience of the colour blue.

Also premiering will be a work from German-Australian duo, BORIS+NATASCHA, which offers viewers a little self-help therapy via a tongue in cheek, guided meditation of 21st century anxieties.

The potential of stillness as an ingress to the mind-body connection will also be explored by Sydney artist, George Khut, in an interactive work that harnesses the stationary viewer's heartbeat to create a kinetic image.

This trio of experiential works will be complemented by a site-specific sound installation from Perth artist, Kylie Ligertwood. Located in PICA's elevator, this newly commissioned piece will explore the transformative powers of sound and its virtual possibilities of flight as visitors travel from one gallery floor to another.

The seminal exhibition *Still, Living* presents a showcase of art that deals with biological systems. It features the international debut of work developed at SymbioticA by renowned artists such as ORLAN, Critical Art Ensemble and The Tissue Culture & Art Project, as well as other major international artists in this field. Projects range from a two-headed worm searching for the right direction; live birds learning new feeding technology; frogs that mutate naturally; the non/sense and nuances of DNA fingerprinting; the fallouts of bio-warfare and torture; a multiethnic skin coat of many colours, architecture that is literally growing, a bleeding angel and notions of life in the 21st century.

"Let's step back a moment, this welcome moment of stillness in the eye of the breaking storm above an increasingly media-hyped art field. As biology's ascent to the status of hottest physical science has been accompanied by the massive use of biological metaphors in the Humanities, this has also generated a wide range of biotech procedures that are providing artists simultaneously with the topics and new expressive media: transgenics, cell and tissue culture, plant and animal selection and breeding, homografts, synthesis of artificial DNA sequences, neurophysiology, synthetic biology, visualisation techniques borrowed from molecular biology and biomedical research. Still, Living is produced by SymbioticA: the Art and Science Collaborative Research Laboratory, School of Anatomy and Human Biology, The University of Western Australia. In 2007, SymbioticA was awarded the prestigious Prix Ars Electronic for Hybrid Art.

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In 1998, ORLAN launched a worldwide tour of differing standards of beauty in various civilizations and through history. Following several stays in Mexico she began with the Pre-Columbian cultures.

Having previously refigured her face through her surgeries, she hybridizes this new image to aesthetic values from these other cultures. Working with a digital technician to mingle the real with the virtual, taking the 'other' inside under her own skin, she creates digital melds of her face with the stone of the Pre-Columbian sculptures, making self-hybridizations in which the grotesque becomes inseparable from the beautiful.

ORLAN says: "One of my favourite maxims is 'remember the future' as it deals with the crossing of time in the series of my *Self-Hybridizations* in which the memory of past sculptures – sometimes belonging to cultures that have disappeared – makes it possible to construct images that anticipate tomorrow, because here and now they question possible futures that are not lost in the ready-made thought of our time, and are not glued to it. This time is not my favourite perfume. Today is already a thing of the past."



Log onto the Internet and view satellite photographs of your house and land, of your neighbours' back yard and new swimming pool. Seemingly innocuous voyeuristic tools, provided by government bodies, could easily exacerbate our consumerist mindset by ensuring we keep up with the Jones's home renovations.

The massive rhizome of the Internet provides increasingly greater access to the real world via the virtual; users are now able to navigate through amazingly accurate representations of real world cities or live a parallel 'life' in a virtual world.

Digital culture pervades contemporary life giving us meaning, buthow dowe symbolically, emotionally, physically and intellectually deal with these representations? We are seduced by the idea the virtualities we see Amanda Allerding (Australia) Jeremy Blank (Australia) Cat Hope (Australia)

are 'actual' and perhaps even more real than our everyday lives. Although this fiction can be 'indistinguishable from reality,'* it can also (with critical interrogation) create diverse forms of communication and potentially new social networks.

Representations of the Real is an exhibition of collaborative digital works examining the differing ways we make sense of our contemporary digital culture through sound, projection and digital video. The way mediation frames us contextualises *Representations of the Real*, provoking questions of public and private space, personal and national identity and location.

David Carson (Australia) Brian McClave (UK) George Millward (USA) Thomas Ulich (Finland)

paintedSKY features the world's first successful recording of the Aurora Borealis in stereoscopic 3D and will be premiered in Australia during BEAP 07 at Horizon, the biggest planetarium in Australasia. The Aurora Borealis, and its Southern equivalent the Aurora Australis, are stunning atmospheric displays representing the dynamic relationship between the Earth and the Sun. Horizon's manager Pete Wheeler says, "Aurora have always intrigued me and, as yet, just like most people, I've not been fortunate to see such a wonderful phenomenon."

The making of this mesmerizing 3D video recording involved the placement of groups of cameras ten miles apart on frozen lakes deep within the Arctic Circle of Finnish Lapland, with temperatures as low as -40C. The exhibition features a 3D movie of the Aurora Borealis extracted from these cameras.

A unique art installation, *paintedSKY* is a collaboration between videographer Brian McClave, electronic musician and atmospheric physicist George Millward, Thomas Ulich, a geophysicist at Finland's Sodankylä Geophysical Observatory, and Western Australian artist David Carson.

ARTISTS

Ralf Rauker (Perth) – concept & performance Merit Fakler (Berlin) – video artist

Stillness in theatre seems to be the biggest risk an artist can take. While 'a still', 'a still life' and a traditional sculpture give the spectator a possibility for contemplation, an actor in stillness can be perceived as something irritating, maybe frightening.

A body on stage kept in stillness for a long time provokes the spectator's speculation whether it's dead or alive, whether it's a puppet, a sculpture or a human. This moment of irritation is the starting point for the performance research, which confronts the traditional sculpture representing a

human body in stillness and the actual living body of the performer presenting sculptural stillness. Here the heartbeat will be of particular interest.

The Caller, a sculpture by German artist Gerhard Marcks (1889–1981), located in frontofthe ArtGallery of Western Australia, will be the physical focus point during the performance. The same sculpture is facing the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin, the city where the performer had been living for 21 years – a transcontinental connection made visible in the performance.

Ralf Rauker in collaboration with Merit Fakler presents ... Performing Hearts Solo

As a traveller between Perth and Berlin since 2002, Ralf Rauker has been collecting, communicating and memorizing cultural, political and autobiographical data in different medias. Within an audio-visual installation using the living, 'real' body, the *Performing Hearts Solo* will expose this journey as a search for stillness.

Ralf Rauker studied acting in Berlin, worked as an actor/director in Europe and, since 2003, has been employed as a contemporary performance lecturer at Edith Cowan University, Perth. Merit Fakler studied set design and video in Berlin. Using her expertise in both areas she works as an artist in Germany and abroad.

Performing Hearts Solo is dedicated to Bertolt Brecht (1898-1956), German political playwright and poet.

While *Performing Hearts Solo* is not a presentation of The Art Gallery of Western Australia, Ralf Rauker greatly appreciates the assistance provided by the Gallery in facilitating his performance.

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The CADE Conference is a major international event for those interested in exploring ideas converging at the intersection of pedagogical methods, arts, design, science, and technology.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS 1: An insight into SymbioticA's Masters in Biological Arts – a course facilitating research at the intersection of art and science.

PRESENTERS: Oron Catts (Australia), Artistic Director of SymbioticA, Artist/Researcher/Curator; Ionat Zurr (Australia), Co-ordinator of Master of Biological Arts, Artist/Researcher/Curator

The Masters in Biological Arts is an innovative course offered through the Faculty of Life and Physical Science at the University of Western Australia. The course is designed for art practitioners, scientists and humanities scholars who wish to engage in interdisciplinary studies as a foundation for creative bioresearch.

Oron Catts and Ionat Zurr specialise in tissue technologies as a medium for artistic expression. They co-founded the Tissue Culture and Art Project (TC&A) in 1996. This project investigates human relationships with different gradients of life through the construction and growth of a new class of object and being – the Semi-Living. TC&A has been exhibited in galleries and museums throughout Europe, North America, Asia and Australia in events such as Ars Electronica (2000), the 2002 Adelaide Biennale of Australian Art, and ISEA.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS 2: A discussion reflecting on twenty-one years of change and achievements by the Association for Computer Aided Art and Design Education (ACAADE, the precursor of today's CADE), in which Paul Brown will explore computational aesthetics in art schools.

PRESENTER: Paul Brown (Australia), Professor, University of Sussex; Artist/Writer

Paul Brown has been specialising in the convergence of art, science and technology since the late 1960s, and in computational and generative art since the mid 1970s. He has exhibited internationally over the past four decades and participated in exhibitions at the TATE, Victoria & Albert, and ICA in the UK; the Adelaide Festival; ARCO in Spain and the Venice Biennale. He is represented in public, corporate, and private collections in Australia, Asia, Europe, Russia and the USA.

Paul Brown became the founding head of the UK's National Centre for Computer Aided Art and Design in 1984. In 1994 he returned to Australia, after a two-year appointment as Professor of Art and Technology at Mississippi State University, to head Griffith University's Multimedia Unit. 
The artists represented include independent, academic and research-active new media artists. Their work shows a rich diversity of styles and imagery from scientific, to generative, ecological and autobiographical.


